# **NOVEMBER: FIRST AID KITS**

Disasters happen anytime and anywhere. When disaster strikes, it is easier to cope when you are prepared. GET READY! Kent County recommends having a First Aid Kit in your home, at work, and in your car.

# **SUPPLIES**

- 2 pairs of latex gloves (or other sterile gloves if you are allergic to latex)
- □ Sterile dressings to stop bleeding
- □ Hypoallergenic adhesive tape
- □ Cleansing agent/soap
- □ Antiseptic
- □ Antibiotic ointment to prevent infection
- □ Moistened towelettes
- □ Burn ointment to prevent infection
- □ Adhesive bandages in a variety of sizes
- $\Box$  Eye wash solution to flush the eyes
- □ Non-breakable thermometer
- $\Box$  Scissors
- □ Tweezers

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#### Where can I find these items?

- Local pharmacies will have most of these
- items, including ready-made First Aid Kits.

#### How much will this cost?

- The cost will depend on the number of items
- on hand in your home and new purchases. A
- good First Aid Kit can be purchased for less
- than \$20.00. Contact the Red Cross for more information.

- an easy to carry container or duffel bag. Don't

# □ Safety razor blade

- Tube of petroleum jelly or other lubricant
  Water purification tablets
  Tissues
  Skin lotion
  Sunscreen lotion
  Instant cold packs for sprains and burns
  Ammonia inhalant (smelling salts)
  Splinting materials
- □ Sling
- □ Waterproof matches

# **PRESCRIPTIONS**

- Medications you take every day such as insulin, heart medicine, and asthma inhalers (you should rotate medicines to account for
- expiration dates)
- Medical supplies such as glucose and blood pressure monitoring equipment and supplies

# NON-PRESCRIPTION DRUGS

- □ Aspirin or non-aspirin pain reliever
- Anti-diarrhea medication
- □ Antacid (for upset stomach)
  - Syrup of Ipecac (use to induce vomiting if advised by the Poison Control Center
  - Laxative
  - Activated charcoal (use if advised by Poison Control)
